Chairman's Update December 2017

2017 has again proved to be a busy and successful year for 'The Friends' in which we have received many gifts and donations to enable the work we do to enhance the working of the Haematology Department. The group of supporters, Blood Sweat and Cheers have now raised over £16,000 for us over the past 2 years-a magnificent achievement through organising concerts, a Ball and sponsored activities. The challenge of the Great North Run was met by our group of runners with each raising funds for us. We have already purchased and allocated the 5 places to supporters for 2018. The Trustees have been pleased to fund all of the requests made by staff and patients including fans for patients, rise and recline chairs, additional CADD pumps for treatments, new equipment for finding veins, cost for 2 medical students to present at a national conference, twelve observation machines for the wards and improvements to a patients home in total £34,000.

We continue to collaborate with the Chevin Socialites but their work to provide Hug on a Tray is now self financing. I mentioned last year about the Patient Hotel and we met with the Hospital but they have not requested any assistance from us to improve the Hotel.

Medical Update December 2017

Firstly I would like to say what a pleasure it was to be asked to join 'The Friends' as a Trustee this year to help advise from the perspective of the clinical department. The Department has continued to change and grow in a very positive way this year and despite increasing demands it has achieved much, thanks to the work of many and the valuable help of 'The Friends'. There has been a significant increase in our clinical trials work and through that the availability of many new and exciting therapies as research expands in all areas of blood cancer. The support of 'The Friends' has allowed us to further increase the number of patients treated through our day care and ambulatory facilities by funding both medical and patient comfort equipment without which patients would have to spend more time in the wards rather than at home. In recognition of their success, our day unit (J87) was awarded 'team of the year' in June at a hospital celebration event at the University of Leeds. It is striking how much we do in the outpatient setting these days that once needed admission and 'The Friends' support has been a key driver for that. As well as practical help, 'The Friends' have supported training opportunities for medical students and nursing staff to improve their ability to develop our services.

There has been many comings and goings this year. Most notably amongst them was the retirement of Dr Graeme Smith- a Trustee of the 'Friends' of course and a consultant whose contribution to our Department and to Haematology in the UK cannot easily be overstated. There was a number of send offs for him, allowing us all the opportunity to thank him for his enormous efforts, support and friendship over the years and we are glad he maintains his links to us through the 'Friends'. Prof David Bowen partly retired but thankfully remains with us part time so we retain his expertise and Andrew Jack retired from our HMDS laboratory, which he had built into a nationally recognised centre of excellence for the diagnosis of blood cancers. Joining us to offset these losses have been 4 new consultants, Gill Gidley, Pedro Martin-Cabrera, Anjum Khan and Manish Jain and we are lucky to have attracted these experts to our team and look forward to the energy they will bring. We have also been joined by 2 trainees from Sri Lanka and our first 'Physician Associate'- a new breed of clinical staff in the UK.
